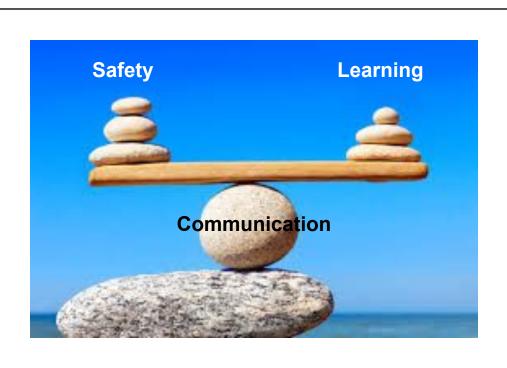
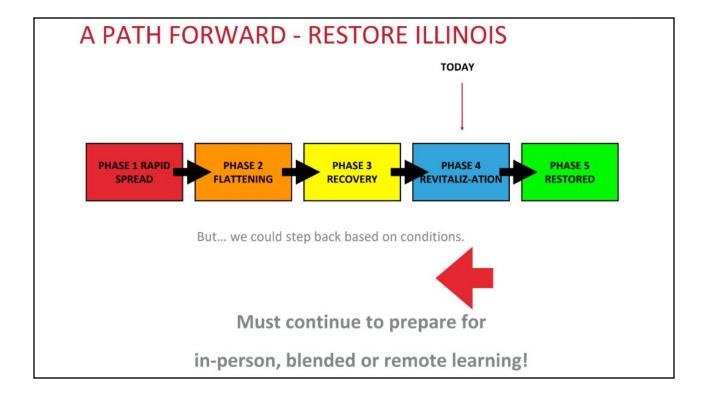

## Here's What...Is Still "Tight"



- ISBE/CDC guidelines (ongoing updates)
- Collaboration across D124 (Grant) consortium
- All decisions will be driven by data
- Staff committees working to develop plans
- Staff training must be provided
- Work within the contract to the extent possible
- Lake County Health Department support will be our "source"
- Balance SAFETY and LEARNING for all

## Here's What...Is "Tight" Per ISBE



"The minimum public health requirements that all public and nonpublic schools must meet as they create local reopening plans in Phase 4 are to:

- Require use of appropriate personal protective equipment (PPE), including face coverings;
- Prohibit more than 50 individuals from gathering in one space;
- Require social distancing be observed as much as possible Maintain 6 ft. social distancing at all times (7/24/20 IDPH/ISBE Update Call);
- Require that schools conduct symptom screenings and temperature checks or require that individuals self-certify that they are free of symptoms before entering school buildings; and
- Require an increase in schoolwide cleaning and disinfection."

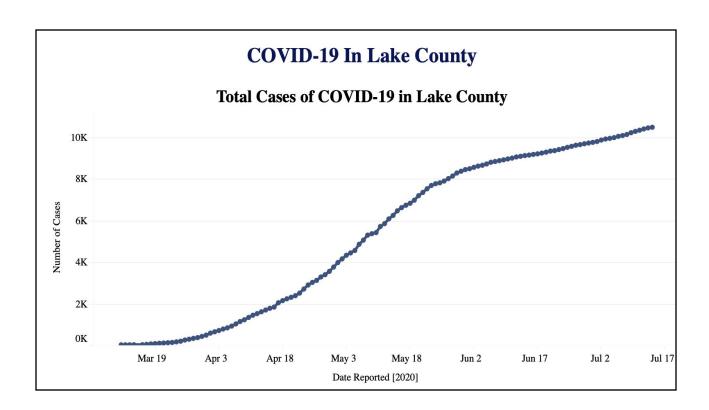

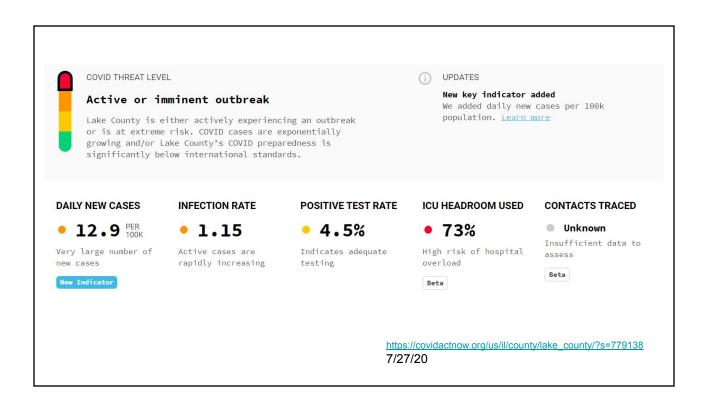
#### Here's What...Are **UPDATED** Recommendations by ISBE

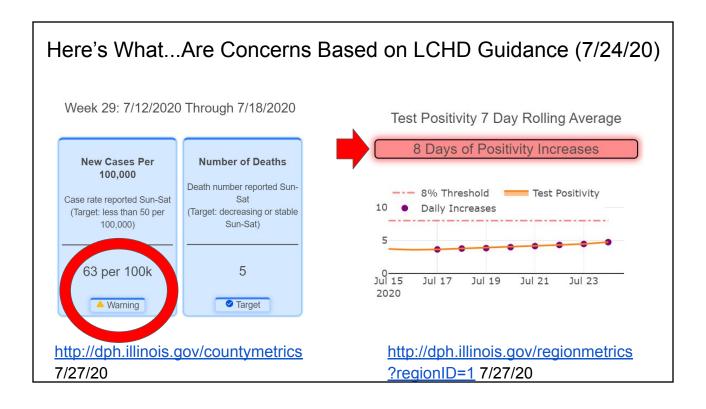
- Provide as much face-to-face (synchronous) instruction as possible, including a recommended 2.5 hours of synchronous instruction daily, based on students' developmental levels (7/23/20 ISBE Guidance Doc).
- Ensure that students identified with IEPs, with 504 plans, or as ELs get additional time/support/access to in-person learning.
- Consider more in-person learning for younger students if possible.
- 5 clock hours of student engagement required daily.
- Daily attendance and engagement of students is expected regardless of learning mode.
- Grades will be issued based on performance.
- Be ready at all times to pivot to another instructional learning model.

Here's What...Are Concerns Based on LCHD Guidance (7/24/20)

 There are increasing infection rates in Lake County, which has pushed the county into a "warning" status. LCHD has stated there will undoubtedly be cases and significant portions of our staff/students impacted, and shared concerns about the impact of typical cold/flu symptoms of the Fall on COVID spread.





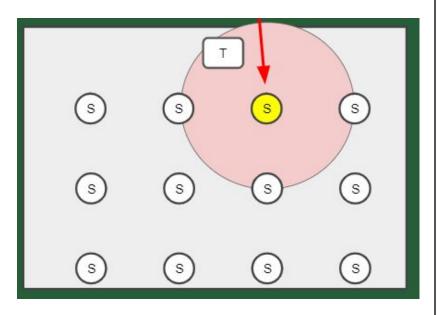


#### Here's What...Are Concerns Based on LCHD Guidance (7/24/20)

- Quarantine guidelines are going to cause significant disruption daily.
   We have yet to receive an official "decision tree" guidance from Lake County Health Department in regards to who/when/for how long to quarantine. Since their information from the CDC continues to be adjusted, they have also had to adjust their guidance documents for us.
  - Summer school examples
  - Contact tracing--within 6 ft for a "period of time" and impact on students and staff

#### Here's What...Are Concerns Based on LCHD Guidance (7/24/20)

- Guidance on 6' of social distancing has changed significantly. It was clarified on Friday by the
  Lake County Health Department that if we can't maintain 6ft. social distancing at all times
  then alternate plans need to be developed. Prior guidance said to maintain the 6ft. "as much
  as possible". Given this new clarification, we are having trouble guaranteeing this will
  happen at all times.
- The Lake County Health Department has now shared that any student or staff member who has one of the <u>symptoms for COVID-19</u> will be required to provide either a negative COVID test or a doctor note to return. <u>Updates will likely include adding symptoms of runny nose and allergies to this list</u>. This will be a huge hurdle for families and staff, as the list of symptoms includes symptoms of other common illnesses. This requirement alone is going to cause massive disruption to the attendance of staff and students.

#### Here's What...Are Concerns Based on LCHD Guidance (7/24/20)

- We were experiencing a substitute shortage before COVID and need a far larger pool of substitutes who are willing to substitute in person to ensure stability as measures such as combining classes if we are without a sub are not an option. Many in the existing substitute pool are shared with other elementary districts in our consortium.
- More restrictive bus guidelines are forthcoming. These could negatively impact our ability to transport students to school in an efficient, cost-effective manner.
- COVID rates in Wisconsin continue to increase. It is likely that they will be added to the Illinois mandatory quarantine list in addition to Chicago's list (7/28/20). We have several staff who live in Wisconsin, and this or an increasingly more strict mandatory quarantine could potentially impact their ability to come to school.







## So What...Is the Updated Proposal?

Due to concerns of being able to meet the safety needs of students, staff, and family AND focus on high levels of learning for <u>all</u> in the current reality, we will open schools 100% remote to start the year until at least September 30, 2020.



#### So What...Are the Elements of Full Remote Learning?

- Students will be expected to engage in 5 clock hours of instruction, broken into manageable chunks of time and maximizing synchronous (live) instruction/interaction with time for work, collaboration, and reflection.
- Instruction will focus on closing any learning gaps, targeting grade level standards, and providing support for students who need support and/or extension to ensure that <u>all</u> students meet grade level standards.
- Instruction may be live (synchronous), video (asynchronous), whole class, small group, individual, and/or independent work.
- Students will have a specific daily schedule to follow, and families will receive a "week at a glance" in order to plan ahead.

# So What...Are the Elements of Full Remote Learning?

- Attendance will be taken daily to make sure all students engage. Support, outreach, and, if needed, truancy processes will be in place to follow up with any students who do not engage.
- Students will have access to all content areas.
- Students and families will receive feedback and grades will be issued.
- All students will be provided a D114 Chromebook in order to complete work and use programs and tools that are core to the remote learning plan.
- All live lessons and work tasks will be recorded/posted in Google
   Classroom so families have flexibility in when they complete work, knowing
   that many families will be balancing work and child care schedules.

#### So What...Will Happen on Wednesdays?

- 5 clock hours still required for students since Wednesdays do "count" as a contact day, with up to 2.5 hours synchronous, depending on students' developmental levels/needs.
- All staff works, as it is a paid day.
- Wednesdays may look like:
  - o Direct instruction (live or video)
  - Student work time
  - o "Office Hours"
  - Feedback to students/parents
  - Dedicated iReady time
  - Additional social-emotional learning activities
  - Targeted intervention and enrichment
  - IEP/504 meetings
  - Staff meetings
  - Professional development
  - Collaborative planning time
  - Other opportunities based on need

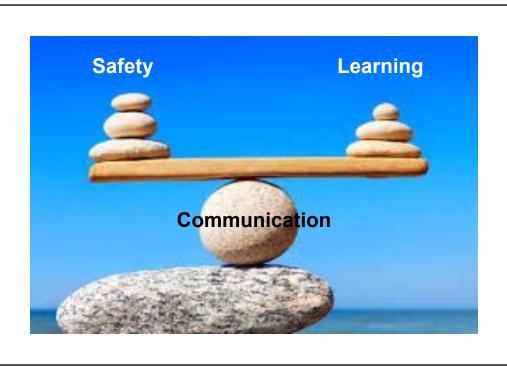
# So What...Is the Impact on the System for Moving to Full Remote Learning?

- Ongoing collaboration with the EAFL in decision-making and communication.
- All employees will be paid their 2020-21 salary and assigned purposeful work to complete in alignment with their position category
  - Example: Bus Drivers can deliver meals using their routes so we meet CEP expectations and eliminate the need for families to come to Grab and Go so they can be home to support Remote Learning.
- The District will follow federal and state law/legal guidelines related to FMLA Emergency Paid Sick Leave (EPSL), Emergency FMLA Expansion, and FMLA with a goal of finding meaningful ways to put all staff to work before asking/providing staff with any paid leave of absence.
- Stipends will not be paid unless the stipend is completed either fully or on a prorated basis. We will work with stipend providers to brainstorm how/if as many clubs as possible can be offered virtually or in-person when we are back to in-person learning in the Blended Model. Our goal is to offer students extracurricular opportunities to the extent we can safely do so. Please note, Fall sports have been cancelled as of 7/27/20.

#### Now What...Pending Board Approval of Full Remote Learning

- Revise master schedules to meet all guidelines and in alignment with Full Remote Learning
- Continue to plan for robust learning opportunities for <u>all</u> in a Full Remote model.
- Identify groups of students who will need in-person learning based on their needs in alignment with ISBE guidance (<u>some</u> IEP, 504, and EL learners).
- Continue to partner with LCHD to monitor readiness for a safe pivot to the Blended Model.
- Communicate with families throughout to respond to student and family needs as well as share information as soon as it is available.
